DESCRIPTION

Poetry provides an excellent way of looking at German culture through art. The basis of the course will be close reading and of poems in the German language across a variety of subgenres through different epochs. The texts we read & discuss are (mostly) short & (always) challenging and allow for ample contextualization and interpretation. The course will be taught in German, and class discussions and assignments will be in German as well.

CLASS GOALS

The course is designed to continue the transition from language to topic courses (GER 205 & 305). Using a literary short form, we focus on reading, understanding and interpreting the poems before contextualizing and historicizing them. Assignments help you acquire skills necessary in German literary studies (structuring arguments in oral presentations & written assignments based on close reading & research). The class will improve your German language skills.

REQUIREMENTS / EVALUATION

Like all course offerings of the German Department, this course requires thorough preparation, continuous attendance and active participation. Students are expected to engage with the texts actively and thoroughly and share their insights in class discussions and Blackboard discussions. Attendance policy: You are required to attend very class with the prepared text in hand. You may miss one session only without valid excuse; after that 10% will be taken off the final grade for each additional unexcused absence.

I also allow (but don't enforce) partner work in presentations, as it allows you to work with a poem in more depth and perhaps also more creatively. Finally, classroom space permitting, you will be seating in changing groups of ~5 people and be assigned group tasks as part of each class session.
